For our younger constituents, in partnership with Lien Foundation, we developed a new model for pre-school - An Inclusive Preschool where children of all abilities can come together and learn and grow as one. Other new initiatives and expansion of existing programmes are detailed in the services section of this report.

In line with our growth, the Board agreed that it was timely to move the provision of our services from a society to a company limited by guarantee to ensure stronger risk governance and better operational efficiency. This was accomplished within the year and AWWA has been accorded the Institution of Public Character (IPC) status.

We are grateful that our efforts in giving were bolstered not just by monetary donations, but also by time and expertise provided by some 10,000 volunteers this year. Many of our volunteers had voiced that they had received as they gave, learning appreciation and graciousness along the way.

As AWWA enters into our 46th year of service, our brand promise reminds us that to give one's time and resources to fellow human beings in need is an extraordinary way to be of service. Thank you all for coming together in this extraordinary way.



## AWWA School

AWWA School provides special education to children with multiple disabilities and children with autism from 7 to 18 years old. The school strongly believes that every student has the potential to learn and excel, thus we always look at his or her abilities. Our students have excelled in the area of sports and have achieved Awards in National Special Schools Swimming and Track & field Championships. Our students also represented the school for the National Disability League Boccia. Not only that, the school broke the 3rd Singapore Record with the "Biggest Picnic Mat" in conjunction with the 35th School Anniversary Celebration. We are also proud to be the first Special Needs School to host President Tony Tan's visit.

Number of clients served: **128 multiple disabilities and 135 ASD (Autism Spectrum Disorders).**

## Development Support Programme

AWWA Development Support Programme offers early intervention for children with mild developmental delay in mainstream pre-school (K1 and K2) to help them overcome their challenges and be better prepared for primary school. The holistic programme focuses beyond the child's limitations and incorporates the child's immediate environment such as their parents, teachers, and classmates to help the child overcome his or her challenges.

Therapy and learning support are introduced in the early stages of the children's learning such as speech, motor skills or socio-emotional development in their environment, helping them to generalise the skills learnt during intervention into a classroom set-up and ultimately realizes their potential for mainstream education.

Total number of children served: **103 children**

## Early Years Centre

AWWA Early Years Centre (EYC) focuses on special needs children aged 6 and below. AWWA EYC adopts a trans-disciplinary approach and employs family-centered practices in the intervention offered to each child.

AWWA EYC offers two programmes – First Challenge and Early Intervention Programme for Infants and Young Children (EIPIC). First Challenge is a daily programme for children with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) while EIPIC offers classes two to three times a week for children with other special needs. Each session lasts for 2.5 hours. To cater to a growing demand for children requiring special needs services, an extension to AWWA Early Years Centre was opened in April 2014.

Total number of children served: **180**



## Goh Zhi Xuan Germaine , Age : 1 year 5 months, Diagnosis : Global Developmental Delay (GDD)

*"After about half a year, we are delighted Germaine has made improvements in many areas. Through constant exposure to music and sensory-based activities, she cries lesser and can now enter the hydrotherapy pool without crying. As the program also provides OT and PT sessions, she can now grab objects better and can put objects in a box as compared to always throwing objects on the ground previously. We are amazed she can walk several steps with the help of a kay-walker. With the guidance from the dedicated teachers and therapists in AWWA Ltd, we believe our daughter will learn how to be independent in years to come."*

## Aqmarul Wazif Bin Abdul Wahab, Age : 6 year 3 months, Diagnosis : Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD)

- Able to follow 2-step instructions independently
- Improved attention and focus on a given task

## EXCELerate Services

EXCEL 360 is a programme for young adults aged between 18 to 25 years old who have not attained a GCE O or N level certificate. The work focus on the psycho, social and emotional development of young adults, where they learn more about themselves and be better planned for the future. Last year, the centre ran the EXCEL 360 workshops with students from ITE to help raise higher awareness of what they can achieve for themselves by discovering their strengths they never knew had.

## SMILES

AWWA SMILES was established in 2006. It is an after-school care programme for students diagnosed with various special needs. AWWA SMILES strives to provide physical care, socialisation and complementary therapy to enrich the quality of life for students. Aside from that, AWWA SMILES also provides respite for caregivers as well as to enable them to return to the workforce and be economically active.

On a day-to-day basis, different types of enrichment activities will be conducted to engage the students. Enrichment activities are categorized according to the following: Life Skills, Physical Activities, Leisure Exploration, Visual Arts and Performing Arts.

# Young Ones

## TEACH ME Services

Started in 1991, AWWA TEACH ME Services has been serving children & youth with physical disabilities and low vision who attend main stream schools. The service aims to achieve AWWA's mission by helping these children and youth integrate into their schools and the community so that they can reach their fullest potential, and lead dignified and independent lives.

### School Integration Services

- School visits
- Consultation with school personnel on school integration strategies
- Assessment, recommendation and training on use of Educational Assistive Technology
- Access accommodations (Special accommodations for school and national level examinations)
- Transition support
- Training and capacity building for school personnel on disability issues

### Community Integration Services

- Mobile and centre bases rehabilitation services (Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy & Speech Language Therapy)
- Educational intervention
- Casework & Counselling, social-emotional support for students and their families
- Independent Living Skills training through workshops and camps
- Sports and Enrichment programmes
- Parents and caregivers support and training

Total clients served: **372**

## Centre for Caregivers

Established in 2006, AWWA Centre for Caregivers (CFC) has engaged more than 35,000 people in Singapore through various public education and outreach initiatives. It serves caregiving families of persons with disability, seniors, as well as chronically and terminally-ill through the provision of information, training and support programmes.

The Centre works with various government agencies and like-minded VWOs, community and corporate partners to advocate for more caregiver-friendly policies, support and services for caregiving families.

### Highlights and New Initiatives

- 1050 participants benefited from attending Caregiving Awareness Talks, Psychosocial Life-Skills workshops and Caregivers Connect activities.
- CFC became the 9th centre participating in MOH's Weekend Respite Pilot Service for family caregivers in March 2015. The centre started in February 2015 operating a day care service on Saturdays for seniors and adults with physical or cognitive disabilities.
- Of the 1,200 people engaged via Caregiving Life-Skills Awareness and Psycho-Social Training sessions, 450 were family caregivers attending workshops at TTSH Care Connect and other venues.
- Of the 600 family caregivers participating in Caregivers Connect activities, 90 percent affirmed reduced stress and having widened their network after participating.



**Ms Jennie Wee looks after her elderly mother who has ageing issues. She became a Caregivers Connect network member since March 2014 and has commented that she enjoys attending the self-care activities.**

*"I am glad I attended most of Caregivers Connect's self-care activities especially those conducted by Mr Gopu Ellappan. It is very beneficial and more caregivers should attend such workshops. Thanks to this session, I am more driven to take care of my neck and shoulder seriously."*

## Resource Centre

To meet our primary objective in making knowledge in all areas of special needs affordable and assessable to the teaching staff at AWWA, parents and caregivers and members of the public, the Resource Centre's focus is in these areas:

- Organising talks/workshops held at the its premises (Internal Workshops);
- Organising workshops for the academic and admission staff for polytechnics and the ITE (External Workshops);
- Organising Disability Awareness Camps for students in mainstream schools;
- Maintaining a Resource Centre on a variety of topics on special needs and learning challenges; and
- Maintaining Singapore's only Toy Library that is open to the public.

## Home Based Care Services

Supported by the Ministry of Social & Family Development (MSF) and ComChest, AWWA Home Based Care Services (HBCS) started as a pilot project in Apr 2014. It aims to support community living for Persons with Disabilities (PWD) through home based services, consisting of physical therapy, personal care, house-keeping and medication reminder. The service caters to adult PWDs who are 16 years old and above, no longer in school, are home bound and have no access to other centre-based services.

Total clients served: **26**

### **Siblings Titus (M) & Justina Lang (F)**

Age: 18 & 23 years old

Diagnosis: Niemann Pick Type C

*"I've found the home-based therapy sessions to be very beneficial to my children. For Justina, we'd often have to bring her for blood tests. In the past, it used to be very difficult to draw blood from her, and it would be an arduous process for all. Ever since AWWA's therapists have been working on her, we found that it was so much easier to draw blood from her, and I think this can be attributed to better blood flow and circulation from therapy. Even with Titus, I noticed that his wrists are less tense after therapy. I never knew that AWWA provided such amazing services until recently, and now that I have seen what it can do for my children, seeing them happy, is the best reward for a parent like me."*

### **Muhd Idham Fayumi (M)**

Age: 26 years old

Diagnosis: Mucopolysaccharidosis

*"Idham is a very independent boy by nature. Even after he was diagnosed with mucopolysaccharidosis, he still wanted to, and managed to find a part-time job, which required him to work with a computer all day. He had to stop, as his muscles eventually became weaker. I am grateful for the home-based therapy services for Idham, because I have personally witnessed for myself the difference in him, before and after therapy. After therapy, his muscles are not as tense, and he's always smiling. Idham is particularly fond of stretching exercises during therapy. Additionally, Idham misses interaction with others, that he was used to while in school and also while working in the past. They may not be aware, but AWWA therapists who visit Idham also provide him with another service – social interaction, as they always patiently converse with him to ask him how he is. As a parent, it makes me very happy to know that my child is able to receive these services from AWWA."* - **Mr Ruslan Japar, Idham's father**

## Community Home for Senior Citizens

AWWA Community Home for Senior Citizens (ComHome) provides seniors above the age of 60 years old, who are on public assistance, have no family or means of financial support, a place to call home. The community home is located at Block 123, Ang Mo Kio Avenue 6. Currently, there are 148 residents at the AWWA Community Home for Senior Citizens. Residents of the community home are empowered to take care of their own units and daily living needs. Regular activities are organised for the folks to maintain their physical and mental health. We also offer guidance and counselling on the challenges of ageing to help our residents create an environment of mutual care and support in their community home.

## Senior Activity Centre

AWWA Senior Activity Centre (SAC) seeks to improve the quality of life of the seniors living in HDB rental blocks 123 and 125 Ang Mo Kio Avenue 6, by integrating them into the wider community and empowering them to be contributing members of the community through the following platform:

- Conduct outreach through regular home visits in order to identify vulnerable seniors, reach out to new members, and touch-base with current members.
- Provide social and recreational activities and support services such as case management, and information and referrals.
- Collaborate with stakeholders and volunteers to enrich the lives of the seniors.
- Encourage volunteerism and the formation of mutual support groups amongst the seniors.

## READYCARE Centre

AWWA READYCARE Centre is a Community Rehabilitation Centre accredited by the Ministry of Health, Singapore. The centre provides rehabilitation and day care services to the clients with physical challenges but with excellent potential to gain optimal recovery in their mobility and day to day functions through structured professional care. The clients undergoes physical rehabilitation program with therapists offering them a range of physiotherapy, occupational therapy and speech therapy intervention while embracing the concepts of person-centred care. The program aims to develop the functional abilities of the clients to the optimum, thereby enhancing the quality of life of the clients we serve.

With a structured Day Care program the centre also enables the caregivers to continue with their respective commitments during the day with the peace of mind. The Centre offers Caregiver education and training and supports them in their journey to offer better care to their loved ones.

In addition, the centre provides two-way transportation in Ang Mo Kio with a sophisticated disabled friendly transport. This centre is also accredited to offer Home Therapy services for those clients who are assessed as not being able to attend the centre based rehabilitation program.

# Family Affairs

## Family Service Centre

AWWA Family Service Centre (FSC) reaches out to individuals and families facing life's challenges by supporting them through casework, counselling as well as information and referral services.

In addition, the centre runs a range of programmes for children, youth, young adults and families in literacy development, building up of self-esteem and emotional resiliency, financial literacy and family bonding workshops and groups. These are made fun and engaging through previously running a series titled 'Loving your Family' where each month families explore the topics of Loving your Spouse, Loving your Parent and Loving your Child. This facilitates the growth of strong relationships within the family that help tide through their challenges in life.

Total number of cases handled: **728**

Approx. Individuals worked with: **2912**



### **Mohd Anizar Bin Amat Sarpin, Male, Age 45 years old** **Mr Anizar is married with three daughters aged 17, 15 and 9 years old.**

Mr Anizar is currently working as a Store cum Delivery personnel. His wife is working as a Part-Time Retail Assistant at NTUC Fair Price. Mr Anizar was away for 7 years when he was imprisoned due to drug offense. Upon his release from prison, he faced challenges in securing a job, reintegrating with his family especially with his daughters to make up for the lost time. Now, he says that he is hopeful and optimistic about the future as he has the support from his wife and daughters. He says, *"I hope I can be a better person and be a better father to support my family"*. His wife also adds, *"He is a very strong man. He doesn't give up easily no matter what obstacles come in his way."* And his daughter also includes, *"I don't know if he knows but he has taught us the importance of self-sacrifice"*.

Mr Anizar's daughters received School Pocket Money Fund (SPMF), family counseling and they attended regular Family Empowerment and Bonding (FEB) workshops.

### **Faridah Bte Yunos, Female, Age 45** **Married with 3 teenage children aged 17 (son) and daughters aged 16 and 15 years old.**

Madam Faridah became the sole breadwinner for the family after her husband was diagnosed with mental health issues. She had difficulty in managing high amount of housing mortgages. They also faced challenges in managing marital issues and handling difficulties to meet their basic subsistence. However, she appreciates the understanding and support of her children as *"they would not ask me to buy anything for them as they know that I can't afford it."* Their first daughter also said, *"We love our parents a lot and it's our duty to help them, that's why we don't mind working part-time"*.

They received the following assistance from AWWA FSC.

- Financial assistance (Food ration and SPMF disbursement).
- Worked with client on her future plans and also provide emotional support through counselling sessions.
- Engaged and linked the family through both internal and external programmes to enhance family relationships and essential life skills.
- Engaged children through FSC's programmes (mentoring to cultivate life skills and financial literacy).

### **Nur Suzieyana**

**Joined the Be Your Own Boss Programme in January 2015. It ran over 4 sessions, in which they learned skills such as product display, product generation, communication within a team, approaching customers and lateral thinking. The sessions culminated in a flea market, where participants applied their skills.**

*"In the Be Your Own Boss programme, we learned how to communicate and respect each member's opinions and learned what different individuals can contribute. Now we know how to decide the products we want to sell and how to execute the designs. Before this, we didn't even know a thing about this. Being in the programme teaches me how to be a good entrepreneur. We also had a lot of fun playing games and getting together as a group."*


